

Old Long Range Plan Wording

<u>Action Step 1</u>. Use comprehensive, integrated curriculum and specific instructional practices so that students have the opportunity to learn clearly defined skills, knowledge, and attitudes based on Alaska State Content and Performance Standards.

- A. Grades K-2 focus on literacy (reading/writing/speaking/listening)
- B. Grades 3-5 focus on math (computation/ problem-solving/application)
- C. Grades 6-8 focus on science and social studies
- D. Grades 9-12 comprehensive focus with options tied to student interest and skills
 - 1. Proficient/advanced skills in literacy, math, social studies, science
 - 2. Vocational opportunities
 - 3. Arts (visual, performance, literary) opportunities
 - 4. Civics/Ethics instruction
 - 5. Health/Physical education courses
 - 6. World Language instruction
 - 7. Technology instruction
 - 8. Advanced placement course offerings





New Long Range Plan Wording

KPBSD will provide services to students in order to prepare them to thrive in a 21st century global economy and society. The District will do this through:

- Step A: A rigorous and comprehensive curriculum where students:
 - Demonstrate effective communication (written, oral, listening) with a variety of audiences
 - Demonstrate effective math skills
 - Demonstrate ability to comprehend complex written material
 - Demonstrate critical thinking and creative abilities
 - Demonstrate necessary competencies in 21st century skills (information management, knowing how to learn, working with others, applying learning)
 - Have appropriate work attitudes preparing them for their next endeavor (responsibility, team member, safety, etc.)
 - Have learned and practiced appropriate social skills and respect for self and others



Good management is essential for leadership to flourish





Eight Highly Effective Habits (taken from ASCD Educational Leadership, November 2007)

- Develop a month by month filing system for resources to help in being proactive
- Use a day timer or a for of scheduling to set concrete goals (road map) for the day
- Delegate
- Practice the "psychology of limits"
- Roam the building with a notebook, and "new" eyes and ears
- Whenever possible, avoid meetings
- Make some decisions unilaterally and communicate well
- Separate what you like to do from what needs to be done
