- 1. What is it we want our students to learn?
- 2. How will we know if each student has learned it?
- 3. How will we respond when some students struggle to learn in?
- 4. How can we extend and enrich the learning for students who already know it?

Five Functions of an Effective Team


- Ability to establish trust
- Ability to engage in honest dialogue regarding disagreements
- Ability to make commitments to one another
- Ability to hold each other accountable
- Ability to focus on results by pursuing specific and measurable goals

Norms of High Performing Team(s) and Team Members

- Willing to consider another's perspective
- Understands spoken or unspoken feelings/concerns
- Communicates positive regard, caring and respect
- Willing and able to evaluate the team's effectiveness
- Seeks feedback and evidence of team effectiveness
- Maintains a positive outlook and attitude
- Proactive problem-solving
- Aware of the individual and group contribution to the purpose and goals of the larger organization

KPBSD Administrator Responsibilities Regarding Collaboration

- 1. Assign teachers to teams
- 2. Establish clear parameters and priorities that guide the work of the teams
- 3. Expect a product artifacts related to the team's collective inquiry
- 4. Help teams focus on issues that impact student learning
- 5. Foster conditions that move educators from work groups, to high-performing collaborative teams.
- 6. Provide clarity regarding the purpose of the collaboration, and the expectations of members.
